CRM 309: Bad Girls: An Introduction to Aggressive and Delinquent Females

I. Introduction

This intersession has been designed to educate and enlighten the student about the influx of girls within populations of juvenile justice institutions and social service agencies. Students will learn about the developed reputation of these "bad girls" for being increasingly aggressive and delinquent in their behaviors. Emphasis will be placed on the unique characteristics and needs of this special group and effective approaches for working with them. Within the intersession meetings and assigned chapter readings, the student will also have an opportunity to learn about the challenges females present to the juvenile justice system. Upon conclusion of the intersession, it is expected that the student will have an understanding of the distinct traits of female delinquents, have a foundation of methods for working with them, and be able to apply their learning with this population.

II. Course Objectives

The student will:

- A. Recognize an influx of female delinquents within society.
- B. Acknowledge the aggressive and delinquent behaviors of girls.
- C. Understand the unique characteristics and needs of this special population.
- D. Be knowledgeable about theories of and effective methods for working with the female delinquent.
- E. Become capable of applying gained knowledge about female delinquents in a case scenario.

IV. Intersession Requirements (including Attendance, Participation and Blackboard)

A. Requirements

Due to the fact that the material covered in this intersession is very sensitive in nature, it is necessary to have course requirements set forth as a means of constructing a safe learning atmosphere. Every student enrolled is expected to follow the guidelines as described as a means to ensure the education of and respect for fellow classmates.

- No act of racism, sexism, ageism, any other "ism," or harassment will be tolerated. Students who choose to engage in such a negative activity will be asked to leave the classroom immediately.
- Class discussions are designed for educational purposes and therefore should not be used to express harmful or disrespectful remarks about fellow classmates or the topics at hand. Any student, who desires to disrupt these discussions, including interruptions, will be asked to leave the room.

REQUIREMENTS CONTINUED

• In efforts of devoting the needed attention to the topics of the course, it is expected that any material having no relevance upon the course content will be packed away during the class session. If the instructor discovers items not relating to the course becoming an interference the instructor reserves the right to confiscate these items until the class is over and the instructor has discussed the problem with the instructor.

B. Attendance

Students are expected to virtually "attend" class on a daily basis throughout the week. Exigent circumstances may be exceptions to the attendance expectation once presented to the instructor. Documentation, which outlines such an emergency will need to be copied for the student filed maintained by the instructor on a confidential basis.

C. Student Participation

Class discussions and student participation are essential within this course. Each student should feel free to raise questions and contribute to the daily topics. There will be lecture material, videos and group projects that students may respond to in efforts of assisting the flow of the class session and enlightening the student's mind. Every student will benefit from the educational curiosities presented by other classmates.

D. Blackboard

Students are required to enroll in the Blackboard site for this intersession no later than the second day of class, preferably sooner. If you are not familiar with Blackboard and the enrolling processing please see the instructor immediately after the first day of class. Blackboard will be used as an online grade book and communications site for you as the student. On Blackboard you will find important course documents, including this syllabus and a study guide for the intersession exam.

V. Assignments, Reading, Examination and Grading

A. Assignments and Reading

1. Daily Worksheets / Quizzes (combos)

There will be four (4) daily worksheets / quizzes. Each of these assignments will be completed as worksheet and then finished as a quiz – the worksheet portion will not be timed, but the quiz portion will be timed at 30 (thirty) minutes for completion. In total up to twenty-five (25) points can be earned each day once the quiz portion has been completed. Therefore, there are one hundred (100) points available from these worksheet / quiz combos. These assignments will be graded immediately upon completion, and grades will be available in "My Grades" on Blackboard. Students may choose to re-take the quiz portion if they are not satisfied with their score, if there is a technological glitch, etc. up to three (3) times, and the highest score will be the one recorded or kept in the grade book. Note that correct answers will not be available in "My Grades" until the due date / time for the quiz has arrived. No late work is accepted under any circumstance.

2. Required Reading

Students are required to read the assigned reader through the duration of the week and material from it will be included on the Exam. There will be additional articles posted to Blackboard, as well.

B. Examination

On the last day of the intersession, there will be an examination, inclusive of objective questions and short answer style questions. This exam will be worth two hundred (200) points and be based upon the material covered in the class meetings and the outside readings. A review style study guide can be found attached to the end of this syllabus. The study guide is designed to enhance the studying process for the student and assure that he / she becomes knowledgeable about the class material and outcome expectations. Exams will be presented in two portions in Blackboard: as an essay exam (with 15 questions at 5 points each) and an objective exam (with 125 questions at 1 point each). Students will have 1 hours to complete the essay exam and 2 hours to complete the objective exam. Once an exam has been opened, it must be completed and it cannot be re-opened or re-started. There is no backtracking while taking either portion of the exam, and questions will be presented just one at a time. Scores for the essay exam will be available once the Instructor has read through them all and an "Announcement" will be posted on Blackboard and an e-mail sent to all students when they are ready for viewing in "My Grades." For the objective exam, scores can be viewed immediately upon completion of the exam in "My Grades," but correct answers will not be available until the due date / time for the exam has arrived. There are no re-takes or multiple attempts for either portion of the exam.

No late exams will be allowed or accepted under any circumstance.

C. Grading

A total of three hundred (300) points may be earned throughout the intersession. Points that are earned by the particular student will be divided by three hundred (300) as a means of calculating a percentage in determining the student's grade. The percentage-grade scale will be as follows:

^{*}For example, if a student earns 280 points out of 300, the student will have earned 93%, which is an "A." Furthermore, notice that the percentage has been rounded by using Microsoft Excel.

D. The Use of Cellular Telephones in Class

As a member of the learning community, each student has a responsibility to other students who are also members of the community. provided through the Student Academic Integrity Policies and Procedures (see section V., A. in this syllabus).

There are two appeal processes available to students. A sanction for class disruption may be appealed using the appeal process stated in the Class Disruption policy. However, a violation that involves a charge of academic dishonesty must be appealed using the process described in the Student Academic Integrity Policies and Procedures. Students have the right to continue attending class while an appeal is in progress.

E. Dropping and Adding Courses

It is the student's responsibility to understand the University's procedure for dropping and adding classes. If a student stops attending this class, but does not follow proper procedures for dropping the class, the student will receive a failing grade* and will also be financially obligated. ^{*}This syllabus is tentative and may change at the instructor's discretion as needed throughout the intersession. If a change is to be made, the students will be advised of said changes via verbal communication in the classroom setting and through the communications component of Blackboard.

FINAL EXAM STUDY GUIDE

Essay Exam

- From each of the two videos shown in class, *Secret Cutting* and *Odd Girl Out*, there will be 5 miniessays questions, each worth 5 points. This will be a total of 50 points towards the exam total. Therefore, it is strongly suggested that notes are taken during the video viewings.
- There will be 5 mini-essay questions from the outside reading of the book *Bad Girl: Confessions* of a Teenage Delinquent. Each of these questions will be worth 5 points, for a total of 25 points toward the exam total. Students will be expected to read a minimum of 8 chapters from this text and more may be beneficial. Example review questions are located at the back of the text.

Objective Exam

• The remaining 125 points of the exam will be earned through 125 multiple choice questions, each worth 1 point. Approximately 25 questions will be derived from each day of lecture and the inclass activities. Thus, keeping notes from lectures and the in-class activity worksheets will be beneficial to the student. *Note that Daily Unit folders close each day in Blackboard at 5:00 p.m.* (central time).
